8. Motions raised by clubs and SD Committee

a. No motions received.

9. Election of MYA SD Officers for 2022

- a. John Owens, District Chair; Brian Summers, District Racing Secretary; Cathy Reid, District Secretary/Publicity; Steve Taylor, District Senior Measurer all indicated their willingness to stand again.
- b. There were no nominations for District Councillor.
- c. There being no other candidates proposed, the four current committee members were elected to continue as the MYA Scottish District officials.

10. AOB

- a. **DF65 and DF95 class captains:** There has been considerable growth in the Scottish District of the DF65 and DF95 classes across several clubs and hence the introduction in 2022 of class championships. The advantages were therefore discussed of having Scottish District DF65 and DF95 class captains to represent their interests. This was accepted.
 - Action: Brian Summers to liaise with Bill Lees and others to establish MYA SD DF65 and DF95 class captains.
- b. MYA SD IOM Travellers series: The format has undergone a number of evolutions in the last 15 years. The current format is score best two results of three events. It was discussed whether the MYA SD IOM Championship should be added so that the format would be best of three from four (three SD IOM Travellers events and the SD IOM Championship).

Proposed: Brian Summers Seconded: Ian Dundas Votes: For – 5 Against – 1 Proposal approved

- i. Action: Brian Summers to update the MYA SD SSIs for 2022.
- c. **SD Councillor role:** Per the Scottish District Constitution, the roles of the Chair and District Councillor are combined. As previously reported, John Owens formally resigned as Scottish District Councillor but volunteered to remain as Chair. The SD Committee have been seeking a replacement District Councillor. To date, nobody has volunteered or been identified to take on either or both roles. It was noted that the old SD constitution could be resurrected to accommodate split Councillor/Chair roles.

- d. **Zoom account:** The overall experience of this trial (free) AGM by Zoom seemed positive and definitely saved a lot of travel time and expense. In addition, it enabled inclusivity of geographically distant clubs. It was therefore considered worthy to see if a paid Zoom account would be useful to (i) the MYA (ii) other MYA Districts (iii) MYA classes?
 - i. Action: John Owens to discuss the feasibility of a Zoom subscription account with the MYA DCO and MYA Treasurer.
- e. **SD website:** Brian Summers talked about his ideas regarding the racing documents being moved to the tab for events in the SD website suggesting renaming the tab as "Race & Event Documents" to be consistent with the MYA main website. John Owens (as webmaster) requested this topic be fully discussed offline rather than solving it as part of the AGM.

REPORT FROM THE SCOTTISH DISTRICT CHAIR

MYA Scottish District Committee

With Covid, it has been a challenging year. Behind the scenes, the 2021 MYA SD Committee (Brian Summers, Steve Taylor, Cathy Reid and myself) continued to put in a lot of effort on behalf of the clubs and their members in Scotland and Northern Ireland. I would like to thank them for their time and wise counsel. They will describe some of their work in their reports but this barely recognises the hours that they expended on activities in the SD and further afield.

Interface with MYA Council on behalf of the MYA SD

During the early part of 2021, I represented you (the MYA affiliated members and Clubs) in a timely manner addressing matters between MYA Council, its officers and yourselves as and when appropriate.

However, although my personal views aligned with the views of many I spoke to within the SD, they increasingly diverged from the direction and decision-making of MYA Council. As the MYA Council employs the principle of "collective responsibility". I was not willing to be associated with these Council decisions. Having discussed the matter with the SD Committee, on 8th July 2021 I tendered my resignation from MYA Council as Scottish District Councillor (see attached letter). My resignation letter was also sent to all members of MYA Council, the SD Club Secretaries and it was also posted on the SD website.

As per the SD Constitution, the roles of SD Councillor and Chair are combined and I also offered to resign as Chair. The SD Committee sought a replacement for the Councillor role but nobody resident in the SD volunteered. Thus, I was requested to continue as SD Chair (and webmaster) which I continue to do.

MYA SD affiliated members (as of September 2021)

Since 2018, the MYA-affiliated membership of the Scottish District has continued to grow. In 2021, the membership has increased during the year by 18 to 184.

As part of my role as the Scottish District Chairman I am also the Scottish District Councillor serving on the MYA Council. With immediate effect, please accept my resignation from the role of Scottish District Councillor.

I would be grateful if fellow members of the Scottish District Committee could arrange a substitute to represent the Scottish District on MYA Council. I am still willing to serve as Scottish District Chair and webmaster.

A common question asked of MYA Council members, District Committees, etc. is, "What are the benefits of joining the MYA?" Right now, I am asking myself the same question.

To their great credit, some MYA Council members work very hard and are extremely effective in serving MYA members. However, I have lost all faith in others and do not trust their motivation to secure the future of an inclusive and vibrant association.

Regrettably, I have come to the conclusion that dysfunctional and disruptive behaviours are causing far more problems for MYA members than solutions. Some examples include the extremely poor understanding of the needs and desires of MYA members and classes by some Council members, systematic and unnecessary over-complication of burdensome regulation, a complete lack of leadership in amicably addressing the sail measurement debacle and the Class Owner Group framework for both IOMGBR (the MYA's largest class) and the Free Sailing class (the MYA's oldest group), etc., etc.

As a consequence, I am no longer willing to waste further time and energy, nor to be associated with the behaviours, the direction being taken and the negative consequences for MYA members.

REPORT FROM THE SCOTTISH DISTRICT RACING SECRETARY

Covid restrictions again affected the early part of our race programme with the first event not possible until IOM Traveller 2 at Forfar on the 10th July. We did manage to run 4 one day events including the Scottish IOM Championship and the IOM Wooden Hulled Championship. This was a big improvement on last season when only one Scottish event was possible. As the season progressed further easing of Covid restrictions has allowed racing to get back to near normal.

Weed has again affected some Scottish District clubs which has precluded them from hosting events particularly with the schedule having to include the mid-summer months which we normally try to avoid.

Members from the Scottish District clubs competed further afield with some success in the 2021 IOM, DF95 and DF65 National Championships with a Scottish skipper (Tich Summers) winning the 2021 IOM National Veterans Championship at Lincoln.

Furthermore, Ian Dundas scored a $1^{\rm st}$ (T3) and a $2^{\rm nd}$ (T2). Steve Taylor scored a $1^{\rm st}$ (T2) and was on the race team for T3 which scored him average points (= a $1^{\rm st}$ place). Therefore, Steve Taylor is the winner of the Sir Thomas Lipton Cup as the 2021 Scottish District IOM Travellers Series Champion.

REPORT FROM THE SCOTTISH DISTRICT SENIOR MEASURER

During the early part of the year in lock down I engaged with the MYA Technical Officer (MYA TO) and provided commentary and photos for the IOM measurers' guide that was being produced and now published on the MYA website.

With both Scottish District Senior Measurer and IOMGBR Technical Officer hats on I have communicated to the MYA TO that there are three major elephants in the room regarding the envisaged measurer training:

- Measurers are volunteers and coming from usually a technical background over many years do not want to be subjected to tests and examination.
- The RYA sail measuring course has little relevance to measuring model yacht sails unless you wish to crease them!
- The continued requirement for RYA membership as well as the time, cost and travel that would be involved.

I have consistently stated that the practical way to move forward to maintain the cohort of measurers we have and attract new ones is to:

- Produce online guidance that current and would be measurers can read and take in and use as reference on top of the excellent check list sheets we already have.
- For the new measure, a practical session of boat and sail measuring with a senior local measurer within Districts with a hands on approach to demonstrate the necessary skills.
- Documenting and recording the above.

To this end during lock-down, I mapped out four guidance modules on Documentation, Sail & Rig Measuring, Hull & Appendage Measuring and Racing Requirements from Part C. Two have almost been completed (Documentation & Sail/Rig Measuring slides packs) with just video to be added.

The project is currently on hold pending the outcome of the COG agreement (this still has not been agreed or signed with the MYA as there is no agreement or consent on the authorities and obligations that will transfer to the COG). Thus, pending agreement I am not wasting time in an area where I currently have no authority.

During the year I solicited feedback from the current Scottish District Measurers (14) on the future training proposals. Four stated they would currently retire at year end as they had done enough, eight would not continue if future MYA proposals (RYA sail measuring) were implemented, one would continue and there was one no return. This review was communicated via John Owens to MYA Council.

Finally, as the sailing got into swing once more, new boats have been measured and our Travellers and Championship programmes have had weight checks of all boats.

As we move into 2022 I will continue (if re-elected) to push for a more pragmatic MYA approach on training to be realised and implemented from the end of 2022. We need new measurers in NI and in the SW part of the district and it is important we get this right.

REPORT FROM BUCHANNESS RADIO YACHT CLUB

Membership stands at 24 seniors and 2 juniors. Club sailing in line with Government requirements was halted for a period of time because of the Covid pandemic and has resumed following Scottish District guidelines. Through the summer months weed was not in any abundance and did not cause any problems.

Classes sailed in the club are:

- DF65 yachts sail on a Wednesday afternoon at 1400 which saw at one event all 13 yachts sailing. On average we would have around seven which gives good competitive racing.
- IOMs sail on Saturday mornings at 10am with 8 to 10 yachts giving good fast racing. We have seen over the weeks some very well presented wooden examples of the IOM and some of Ian Vickers V9, V10 and V11s making an appearance with more to come. Buchanness has a fleet of modern IOM and DF65 yachts.
- Fifies: probably suffered from a combination of Covid and poor wind direction. There are five skippers who sail these graceful craft but as you grow older they seem to get a bit heavy and access is on the difficult but next year we will give it a try again.

Some of us have been going into scale models in particular fishing boats and we hope to expand in this direction and have been in conversation with others in the town who have shown interest.

This year we have restarted the DF65 monthly event and that went well with Bill Odger winning the first one. We only had two or three Fifie races. As yet we have not restarted the IOM monthly which we may do next year. We did host the 2921 Scottish District IOM Championship which was a close fought regatta with Ian Dundas just winning.

In 2022, Buchanness will host a SD IOM Traveller event. We were asked to host (new to the district) a DF65 Scottish District Championship but we thought it would be better run by one of the clubs nearer the central belt with the focus on more access to numbers.

REPORT FROM CARRICKFERGUS

The objectives of the Club are to encourage the building and sailing of model boats by holding meetings, holding or taking part in exhibitions or demonstrations, organizing model yacht racing or other competitions, and by any other means considered appropriate by the executive committee. That's the official bit. In reality while we do have power driven models, the main activity of the club centres around model yacht sailing and racing mostly, but not exclusively, in the IOM class. The racing is organized into seasonal events, spring, summer, autumn and winter series with occasional one-off events and a special regatta each year.

We have eighteen members of which only about eight could be considered as active. Generally, if six turn up we would consider this a good day. We meet in Carrickfergus harbour on most Saturday afternoons throughout the year. Carrickfergus is in Co Antrim, Northern Ireland and lies on the NW shore of Belfast Lough about six miles NE of Belfast. Our venue provides us with excellent facilities for sailing although in salt water. From time to time we do experience parking and access difficulties but we can mostly overcome these.

As an MYA affiliated club, we welcome new members and would extend a warm welcome to any visitors from across the UK, Republic of Ireland or indeed anywhere else. If anyone is in the area and would like to sail, we'll get you an IOM to borrow and you can join in with likeminded sailors.

REPORT FROM PAISLEY MYC

The Pond in Barshaw Park remained clear of weed until the middle of June 2021; unfortunately we were unable to sail until mid-April because of Covid restrictions but, as soon as we could, we resumed regular sailing in small groups, in generally favourable weather, until Blanket Weed appeared. A number of our members who were shielding or otherwise limiting their contacts with those outside their households have not taken part in any club activity.

We were programmed to host the first Scottish IOM Travellers of the year in June but withdrew because the Covid restrictions still in place severely limited the numbers who could attend - in a public space we could not offer an appropriate 'field of play bubble'. This turned out to have been a wise decision as the arrival of the weed would have severely compromised the event.

Immediately on the discovery of the Blanket Weed we held a discussion with officials of Renfrewshire Council and suggested a non-toxic treatment for the Pond that might clear it in two weeks. We believe that about two months later the Council did apply the treatment but they have not told us they had done so. In any event the Blanket Weed started to disappear but was replaced by a return of the Canadian Pond Weed of previous years. We are still unable to sail at Barshaw Pond but are hopeful that colder winter nights will hasten the departure of the weed and that we might be sailing again from the end of October.

Several members of the Club sailed with the Ayr Bay Club at Irvine Beach Park in April and May and at Castle Semple Loch in mostly shirt-sleeve weather during July & August - until the arrival of weed at each venue.

Our discussions with Renfrewshire Council on a permanent solution to the weed problem were shelved owing to Covid. The local MP intervened with the Council following a meeting held under the auspices of The Friends of Barshaw Park of which the Club is a member, however the response to his letter contained nothing beyond the usual platitudes.

As in 2020, local members able to take their prescribed exercise in the Park counted large numbers of swans on the pond in the spring. By the time the Blanket Weed arrived there were none. By late September they were returning in strength and the weed appears to be in decline. I conclude that they do not have much taste for Blanket Weed but I still have rather more faith in Messrs A. Swan & Co. for weed removal than in Renfrewshire Council!
