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REPORT FROM THE MYA SCOTTISH DISTRICT CHAIR

MYA Scottish District Committee

As we emerged from the main Covid restrictions, it has been a year with far more racing. Behind the scenes, the 2022 MYA SD Committee (Brian Summers, Steve Taylor, Cathy Reid and myself) continued to put in a lot of effort on behalf of the clubs and their members in Scotland and Northern Ireland. I would like to thank them for their time and support. They will describe some of their work in their reports but this barely recognises the hours they expended on activities in the Scottish District and further afield.

A word of special recognition is due to Cathy Reid who is standing down as MYA Scottish District Secretary after several years on the District Committee. Her contribution, particularly as a "non-sailor", has been noteworthy and we are extremely grateful for her service on behalf of the District Committee and the membership of the Scottish District.

Although the role of Scottish District Councillor remains unfilled on MYA Council, I maintain informal contact with MYA Executive Officers. This ensures that our views are represented.

MYA Scottish District website

In addition to my role as District Chair, I also maintain the Scottish District website with new material provided by the District Committee and race teams and ensure that relevant material is emailed to club secretaries for them to forward to their club members.

Highlights of the year

In looking back over 2022, my personal reflection is that the highlight of the year is the way in which Scottish District clubs and individuals worked together and contributed to a very successful sailing year.

An excellent example was the contribution of clubs and individuals from across the Scottish District organising and running the 2022 MYA IOM National Championship at Castle Semple in late April/early May. Planning began at least eighteen months in advance. Without the "virtual" team, this premier event in the MYA calendar could not have been run. Its success is testament to the competencies and cooperative mindset within the Scottish District. More of this later.

Throughout the year, there has been a very successful Scottish District sailing programme. This included the IOM Travellers Series and the introduction of the Scottish District DF65 and DF95 Championships. In addition, several "open" events were hosted by clubs which contributed to the number of times skippers could hone their skills and experience at different locations. The contribution of the host clubs and the race teams are gratefully acknowledged for their time, effort and quality of events.

2022 MYA IOM National Championship (event website)

This premier event in the MYA calendar, a three-day competition, was run at Castle Semple. This is a "green" site given that there is not a resident MYA club located there. The support of the Castle Semple management team and Race Team members from outside the Scottish District is acknowledged.

Eighteen months of planning and preparation by numerous individuals from throughout the Scottish District is gratefully acknowledged. Prior to the event, kick plates were installed along edges of some parts of the control area to reduce the chance of participants stepping into the water. Clubs and individuals had to transport all the relevant equipment to Castle Semple for the Friday opening of registration, measurement and practice racing. Material then had to be rigged down overnight, set up early the next morning and everything had to be completely removed on Monday afternoon. (The lowlight was when the PRO managed to sleep in on the Saturday morning!)

Despite the uncooperative weather, the feedback from several internationally experienced competitors was overwhelmingly positive including:

"... it went very smoothly and was a credit to the whole race team."

"... thanks for a great event. The tone of the event from the outset was one of measured control that always flows through the fleet. The race team dealt with their own difficulties brought on by the wind with patience getting the best possible solution near every time."

The MYA David Perkins Memorial Award was awarded to David Smith in recognition of his organisational contribution to the event over many months.

The MYA Scottish District Boussy Medallion was awarded to Andrea Roberts.

REPORT FROM THE MYA SCOTTISH DISTRICT RACING SECRETARY

This year saw a return to a full race programme following previous two years of Covid restrictions. We returned to loading the beginning and end of the season leaving holiday months of July and August free which also attempts to avoid the worst of the weed which affects some venues.

The MYA Scottish District IOM Travellers Series was changed to include the Scottish District IOM Championship giving a four-event series with the competitors best three results to count to their overall score. The scoring system was also changed to simplify the calculation of places. A total of 24 skippers took part in the Scottish District IOM events.

For the first time we introduced MYA Scottish District DF95 and DF65 Championships, recognising that these classes have gained popularity with some Scottish District clubs. Twelve skippers took part in the DF95 Championship and nine in the DF65 Championship. It is hoped that the members who sail these classes will become more involved in MYA Scottish District activities in future years.

The Scottish District hosted the MYA National IOM Championship with our Chair, John Owens, as Principal Race Officer assisted by members from various Scottish clubs.

Members from the Scottish clubs again competed further afield, acquitting themselves well and Ian Dundas was a member of the GBR team who travelled to the IOM World Championship in Croatia.

In March this year the MYA TO (Technical Officer) directly asked measurers if any wished to stand down, From the Scottish District our following measurers elected to do so:

I wish to thank all of them for their sterling work over the years and I think all of you have benefitted from their help and advice on measuring issues and getting new boats on the water that meet the class rules and thus promoting fair sailing. A very big "Thank You" to you all!

I also see Douglas Thornton has come off the current listing - an issue which I am currently pursuing.

in the latter stages of 2021, I and the others in the IOMGBR team resigned due to intransigence of the MYA to devolve acceptable operational issues within the COG agreement thus making it pointless to continue. At the time of writing last year's epistle this decision had not been made.

Currently the MYA TO does not recognise the District Senior Measurers and as such there is no technical committee. Any dialogue to discuss rule changes, measuring protocol and training is promulgated without this important discussion and verification.

I am aware that during the early part of the year RYA convened a meeting with the MYA Chairman to discuss and agree measurement responsibility and protocol for Model Yachting in the UK. This resulted in the recent updated communication (click here) from the RYA in late August giving the MYA that responsibility and asking for a suitable sail measuring course that they could endorse.

Due to the above it is still not clear to me the form measurement training will take place and in particular specific sail measurement training and the medium that will be used. I have supplied the MYA TO with some of the material I had been working on in 2021 as I thought it might help, but little of any substance has been returned. To me the only thing that is clear as Measurers is we have an extended stay till December 2023 and will await to see what the coming year brings!

Finally, I have served in this position since 2015 and with a number of other things going on in my life feel it is time for a fresh head to take on this role and would be pleased to pass on the baton if there are any willing takers?

We also ran an open event for wooden IOMs and GRP hulls which worked very well. After fifteen races Brian Summers won the woody prize with Stuart Teasdale the GRP and Richard Ennos the furthest travelled skipper.

DF95

There are now two members with DF95s. They went to the first DF95 Scottish District Championship at Greenock with both skippers only having about an hour practice with their new yachts, Ali Law was 2nd and Alan McKechnie was 10th which despite the figures was a good show. It is likely that more DF95s will appear in BRYC as they have done in other Scottish District clubs.

The club was represented at the 2022 MYA IOM National Championship at Castle Semple this year with Bill Odger, Alan McKechnie and Ian Dundas competing. John Owens was Principal Race Officer while Malcolm Davies and Brian Crawford fulfilled the mark setting and rescue boat duties.

This has been a much more successful year than last year. The pond has not been too badly affected by weed so we have not lost many days sailing. Inverciyed District Council installed barley rope in some areas of the pond and hopefully this will help in the future.

Members are sailing IOMs on a Sunday afternoon and the average turnout is about 5 skippers. However, DF95s on a Tuesday afternoon seem to be more popular now with up to 8 or 9 members sailing.

Our DF65 section is proving popular this year sailing on a Sunday morning in the shorter days and Thursday evenings in the summer. These rounds attempt to complete 10 races with the final overall result feeding into a quarterly series. The results have been very close with a different winner in each series. The average numbers of each of the rounds is 8 boats with the most being 15. There is a loan boat for anyone to have a go.

The club hosted the 2022 MYA Scottish District DF95 Championship on 14th May 2022. There was a good turnout with 12 skippers, some coming from as far away as Peterhead. The weather could not have been better and the wind was 10 knots. The competition was won by Chris Nichols of Levenhall RYC and a good day was had by all. We are hoping to hold competitions for DF95s and 65s over a weekend next year as well as hosting the Scotts of Greenock trophy for IOMs.

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REPORT FROM KINGHORN RADIO SAILING CLUB

The Kinghorn Club has been active throughout the year and have hosted two MYA Scottish District events and taken part in a joint event at Levenhall.

The club has 13 full members along with 3 associate members and we have welcomed visiting skippers from other clubs on several occasions. We carry out club sailing on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons between 12 midday and 3pm all year round and we typically have six sailing on a Wednesday and up to ten on a Saturday.

On the 26th February we took part in an interclub event with Levenhall RSC in memory of Tom Milne a long-term member of both clubs who passed away in October 2021. Kinghorn won the first event and are due to host a return event with Levenhall for the Quaich at Kinghorn.

On the 7th May a few members the club took part in the Craigencalt Trust 'come and try day'. We had a number of boats taking part and members of the public trying them under instruction from members.

On the 22nd June 2022 a few members remained on after the Wednesday racing to let Fife Disabled Carers on their open day sample radio control sailing.

There was minor weed growth in Kinghorn Loch this summer but managed to work around the problem by members clearing launching areas. There was no need to use weed markers this year as the weeds at the loch edge did no grow as thickly.

Two new members joined the club this summer. The club also purchased a second-hand IOM (a Lintel) for use on open days and by new members. In the late summer, following discussion with members, we decided to purchase a rescue boat that was lighter to handle. With the help of one of our members were able to source a second-hand BiC Sportyak 245. This has a catamaran hull and is much more stable and lighter to launch and recover. The old inflatable dinghy was subsequently repaired and sold locally as was the old fiberglass dinghy.

On the 10th September the club hosted the first MYA Scottish District DF65 Championship which attracted nine skippers from all over Scotland. We managed 14 races in a day of variable wind speeds and directions. Thanks to all the club members who assisted with organisation and running of the event.

On 15th October the club hosted the MYA Scottish District Travellers 3. We had very consistent wind conditions on the day with skippers starting on top end of A rigs and then moving to their B rigs after Race 3. 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REPORT FROM LEVENHALL RADIO YACHT CLUB

Once again, the 2021/22 season has been a disappointment with the pond rapidly filling up with weed, preventing sailing from April until late October.

Sadly, we must record the death of two members John Dewar and club stalwart Tom Milne.

A joint racing event with members of Kinghorn RSC was held in February in memory of Tom who was a member of both clubs. The clubs were delighted to have Tom's family along for the event and to present the cup.

The condition of the pond and lack of facilities is cause for concern and we are constantly requesting improvements to the pond. East Lothian Council (ELC) have arranged (as in previous years) the appointment of a contractor to cut and remove the weed. Three attempts were made this year leaving damage to the liner and cut weed floating on the top. Also, low water spoilt any attempt to sail until October. As with many other local authorities, ELC have a limited budget with no monies available for any work at the pond. We are constantly searching for alternative/additional sailing water without so far, any suitable venues having been identified.

Occasional DF65 racing was organised on Sunday mornings at Granton harbour with 6-8 skippers taking part - great fun dodging between the moorings.

Membership is fluctuating – fourteen full members (MYA) with only 4-6 actively sailing IOM's. In addition, we have about five DF65's who we could expect to see during the winter. Two of the original DF65 sailors have converted to IOM. We are also fortunate to have two new IOM skippers joining this season.

With no sign of improvements to the site in general and the constant low water, lack of suitable resources will once again prevent the Club holding any open events

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REPORT FROM PAISLEY MODEL YACHT CLUB

After 5 years and many meetings/emails etc. the removal of the sludge from the Pond in Barshaw Park started on 31st March 2022. Several thousand tonnes of sludge were removed by two tracked diggers and two tracked dumpers over the next month. An additional launching platform we had requested was installed near the mid-point of the east bank.

The Pond could not be refilled with mains water, so we had to wait till the beginning of September before natural rainfall gave sufficient water to float our yachts. The pond is now around 30 cm deeper since the sludge was removed. Ironically, during the warm summer months with low water levels some weed reappeared (pond weed not the dreaded Canadian pond weed). The Council treated the Pond with dye and Hydra Lake Clear in August followed by regular treatments of dye and Symbio until the end of October.

We wrote a submission for the Council's "You Decide" campaign in Nov 2021 and submitted a request for funds (£50K) to refurbish the Pond's embankments in advance of the its centenary in 2024. This campaign does not seem to have progressed to a conclusion and it is unlikely the Pond will receive any more funding due to a significant black hole appearing in the Council's budget. So we are fortunate that we got the bottom cleaned just before the financial crisis hit.

The Council suggested we hold a 'Re-Opening of the Pond' event. We decided this should be an Open event for the DF95 class and this was planned for 25^{th} September but due to residual floating weed this had to be reset to 8^{th} October. Unfortunately, following torrential rain on 6^{th} October, the Pond overflowed, completely submerging the pathways and piers, and the event had to be further delayed till 22^{nd} October. The weather conditions on 22^{nd} were not kind to us but the event was enjoyed by all who attended. Hopefully with the detritus removed the weed will not reappear and we can have summer month sailing next year.

We received a request from the Renfrewshire Valuation Board for details of our section of the clubhouse to determine whether it should be included on the Valuation Roll and subject to Non-Domestic Rates. The legislation exempting buildings in Parks from rateable valuation changes in 2023 and we await any financial implications this may have for us.

Several members of the Club sailed with the Ayr Bay Club at Irvine Beach Park in April & May and at Castle Semple Loch in mostly shirt-sleeve weather during June & July - until the arrival of weed at each venue. Members also participated in District events at venues from Irvine to Peterhead.
