Background/motivation/justification

Currently, the winner of a Scottish District trophy must be registered through the MYA via a Scottish District club. E.g., If the winning skipper is registered with a non-Scottish District club, they are able to win an event but it is the highest placed Scottish District club skipper that receives the trophy.

It is proposed that this will change so that the winning skipper, regardless of the MYA club through which they are registered, can receive the trophy. To achieve this, it is proposed to change wording of first part of Scottish District standard Notice of Race Item 3

From present wording

Entry and Eligibility – Entry is open to MYA members of MYA Scottish District Clubs and to visiting members of other MYA Clubs. Only members of MYA Scottish District Clubs are eligible to be presented with the overall winner's trophy. All boats shall comply with the Class Rules. Competitors shall be required to undertake to sail in accordance with the RYA Sailing Charter.

To proposed wording:

Entry and Eligibility – Entry is open to all members of MYA affiliated Clubs. All boats shall comply with the Class Rules. Competitors shall be required to undertake to sail in accordance with the **RYA Sailing Charter**.

Please note that under the SD Sailing Instructions - 'Only skippers who are MYA members and affiliated via a MYA Scottish District club may be placed in the overall results for the IOM Championship series in any year.' It is not the intension to change this under the above proposal.

REPORT FROM THE MYA SCOTTISH DISTRICT CHAIR

MYA Scottish District Committee

Highlights this year include the organisation of lots of great racing at club and District level in the different classes sailed in the SD and welcoming three new clubs to the Scottish District, namely Largs MBC in Scotland with Strangford Lough MBC and North Downs MYC in Northern Ireland. The SD now has fifteen clubs (12 in Scotland and 3 in Northern Ireland) sailing IOM, DF95, DF65, RC Lasers, R6M and free sailing classes.

Behind the scenes, the 2023 MYA SD Committee (Brian Summers, Steve Taylor and myself) continued to put in a lot of effort on behalf of the clubs and their members in Scotland and Northern Ireland. I would like to thank them for their time and support. They will describe some of their work in their reports but this barely recognises the hours expended on activities in the Scottish District and further afield.

No Scottish District Secretary in 2023

Disappointingly, nobody volunteered for this post. Thus, I also undertook the role of Secretary. In addition, I maintain the Scottish District website with new material provided by the District Committee and race teams as and when requested as well as ensuring that relevant material is emailed to club secretaries for them to forward to their club members. Although the role of Scottish District Councillor remains unfilled on MYA Council, I maintain informal contact with MYA officers. This ensures that our views are represented. This situation is not tenable for 2024 and a volunteer, preferably from the west coast and a non-IOM skipper, is desirable.

REPORT FROM THE MYA SCOTTISH DISTRICT RACING SECRETARY

2023 saw a full programme of events across the Scottish District with three IOM Travellers events, the IOM Championship, the Wooden Hulled IOM Championship, the DF95 Scottish Championship and the DF65 Scottish Championship.

These events were scheduled to avoid the National events for the classes we sail and geared towards the beginning and end of the season to avoid the peak summer holidays and the weed which affects some clubs.

Twenty-four skippers took part in the yearlong IOM series with a range of craft from the home design and built to the latest offerings from the professional manufacturers resulting in close fought highly competitive racing.

Ten skippers took part in the 2023 MYA Scottish District IOM Wooden Hulled Championship which was introduced some year ago to encourage home-building of IOM class yachts; ten competed for the DF95 Championship in its second year and seven in the DF65 Championship.

We had no national events to host this year having run the MYA IOM National Championship in 2022 at Castle Semple.

Scottish District skippers again travelled south to national events.

This has been an important year as our current measurers have to align with the new MYA direction (attend RYA sail measurers course plus a Q&A on specific yacht measurement).

I am pleased to say that this first element has just been completed and we have successfully put six of our current and three future candidates through the RYA Sail Measurement course.

We still have gaps in our coverage as we were unable to get a NI candidate to join. Gordon Allison has volunteered to be a measurer on the west coast but was unable to attend due to work commitments. Gordon has built many a boat so it should not take him long to get up to speed once he has got the RYA course under his belt. It is important to note that the West Coast is still low on the measuring count as is NI and it would be good to get one or two more measurers if possible. if anybody is interested, please give me a call.

There will be other course opportunities and I will endeavour to update them on when and where. This only leaves what is believed will be a Q&A sheet on specific class measurement that presumably can be done remotely and then hopefully that will be us back to normal.

Thanks go to Royal Tay Yacht Club who provided the excellent facilities and Gail Joyce of Scottish RYA for arranging/scheduling the course with Southampton.

I would also like to thank two measuring stalwarts namely Hughie Shields and Ali Law. Both have decided it is time to hang up their pencils and rulers and pass on their measuring tanks! These guys are one of the reasons why the Scottish District standards of measurement and event inspection are so good. I remember attending an IOM Nationals a few years ago south of the border where one guy, well up in the MYA hierarchy was drilling lead out of his fin to get it to weight stated, "We never used to do this malarky till you guys started it!" Well done guys you have done your bit!

Finally, as mentioned last year, I have served in this position since 2015. Also, the Scottish District Committee officers are NE centric – whether this is being part of a club with no water or not, I don't know! Anyhow, are there any willing takers?

Once again the 2023 summer season was a disappointment with the pond rapidly filling up with weed and preventing sailing from April until October. As a result, open events and club racing were cancelled.

The condition of the pond and lack of facilities is cause for concern and we are constantly requesting improvements to the pond. East Lothian Council (ELC) appointed a contractor to cut and remove the weed on two occasions. However, excess floating weed and rapid regrowth in the summer meant the first cut was of little practical use. The most recent cut has been successful and we have restarted activities.

The roadway has also been improved (slightly) so is navigable with care by family saloon cars without damage.

An ELC draft regeneration plan for the park was offered for consultation during the course of the year. We took the opportunity to make a comprehensive response highlighting the amenity potential of the pond should it be maintained to a reasonable standard. Most of the draft plan covered birdwatching, ecological issues and access for disabled so we hope to have made a difference through a coordinated response.

Turnout is typically 5-7 IOMs on Saturdays during the winter. Several members have also successfully negotiated private access to Whiteadder Reservoir and race IOMs midweek. DF65 racing takes place during winter months on Sundays at Granton harbour according to tides with 6-8 skippers typically taking part - great fun dodging between the moorings.

A lively WhatsApp group keeps members abreast of sailing activities, new launches and construction/maintenance tips.
